HISTORY 2009 - 2018

The reason for making Trappers Trail

Trappers Trail was made as a social, low key sled dog race in Svalbard as mushing was an increasing activity among inhabitants of Longyearbyen and Ny-Ålesund. The first year there were only 11 teams participating, but already in 2010 there were 16 teams signed up for the race. A coupe of years 2-3 teams came from Ny-Ålesund to participate. And several years participants from the mainland have taken part in the race. As the interest of mushing and sled dogs increased in Norway and also in Svalbard, more and more dogs and mushers became active in Longyearbyen. In 2016 there were 25 teams participating in the race. The niveau of the mushers (and the dogs) has also increased. The total race time results have decreased in all classes throughout the years, although this is also a little dependent on weather and snow conditions.

Trappers Trail is an important "season goal" for many local mushers – inspiring many to train for participation in the race. The 70km race has always been a low-key race and had a social profile. And it still has. However, longer, alternative routes and alternative race classes have been suggested. In the future of Trappers Trail we might see that the distance will increase or new competing classes appear.

The logo used since 2009



Since the very start a photo taken by Stefan Claes (many years participant of Trappers Trail – 9 years in 2018) was used as the logo. Throughout the years there has been t-shirts made with both the logos presented here. Currently there are no more t-shirts so a new era for t-shirts or other gadgets are possible. In 2016 Trappers Trail buffs were made with this logo. We still have some of these left.

5 years anniversary diploma and badge - launched in Trappers Trail 2014

For the 5th Trappers Trail a badge looking like the number 5 was made. Currently (2017) 11 people have received this badge. After 2018 race 17 will have received the badge. A total of 93 individual mushers has competed in the race in the period 2009-2017. After 2018 there will be more than 100 participants that have taken part in the race. In 2018 one person will have completed all of the 10 Trappers Trail as the first and one and only person: **Tina Faust Sølvsten**.



HISTORY 2009 - 2018 cont.

Initiativ-takers, committees and volunteers

The race was initiated by Sebastien Barrault and Harvey Goodwin in 2009, Elin Lien Blixhavn joined the organizers from 2010. For several years they all took part in the committee for the race. In addition a few other people has also been members of the organizing committee for more than 2 years; Kirsten Kahler, Elise Strømseng, Troels Ørsted Yttredal, Kai Ketil Sand. Also there has been other committee members helping out for 1 or 2 years. Ever since the start of the race persons from Longyearbyen Hundeklubb, inhabitants of Longyearbyen and especially UNIS-students have volunteered during the race. Volunteers typically receive a t-shirt or a buff for helping out. A couple of years UNIS students have competed in the race as well.



Sponsors throughout the years

Throughout the years Trappers Trail have had several sponsors. Companies in town have supported the race by giving prizes, making food (stew or burgers served for free at Bikkjebu the first years), providing soft drinks, providing equipment, allowed committee members to use working time on race preparations, and giving nice prices on food/drinks during our price ceremony evening. Telenor financed the current start bibs which are the same bibs as used in Finnmarksløpet.

Special happenings in Trappers Trail history

Soft drinks and cookies: The first few years there were a manned checkpoint at Fritthamn. Soft drinks were served to mushers both at Fritthamn day 1 and Passet on day 2. In the start area LHK served "saft" and cookies to the audience.

Sprint and climb: Since the first race there has been "side-prices", and two of these has been to the fastest team and the best climbers. The first years the "winner of the climbing" and "winner of the sprint" from the previous years had to carry a t-shirt during the race to show that they were the "defenders" of these prizes. The sprint-price: Day 1 - From the START to road-crossing to Todalen + day 2 – from Passet to FINISH. The climb-price: From bottom of Todalen canyon to Frithamn + bottom of Fardalsbakken to Passet. Prices was handed out for the fastest team, timing for the distances on both days added. Sprint was eliminated after 2015, but was reintroduced for one year in 2017 due to change of route. Climb was changed from 2014 to only being the climb up Fardalsbakken on day 2.

The northernmost sled dog race: Because of Trappers Trail the well-known "Finnmarksløpet" in Norway had to change their title from "The northernmost sled-dog race" to "The northermost *long-distance* sled-dog race".

The weather: In 2017 and 2018 poor weather conditions and snow conditions made it necessary to change the original route to Kapp Laila.

The dates: The race has been held in March, April and May. The first TT was in May, however, time has shown that the weather and snow connditions are best in April.

Kennel cough: In 2015 a break out of kennel cough happened almost at the same time as the race. Several participants got affected and could not participate. The committee organized with Mattilsynet and Svalbard Vet. to make sure the race had professional help for checking of dogs during the race. The veterinarian also participated in 2016. These are the only years with veterinarian in Trappers Trail. Still – Harald Os in Mattilsynet, has been taking part in the "social part" of Trappers Trail in many of the 10 year history. 
Route

The route – new routes – cancelled routes

The route of Trappers Trail has always been 70km, 40km day 1 (red line) and 30km day 2 (yellow line). The first years an additional route was made (longer distance), however few teams signed up for this route and it was thus cancelled. In 2016 the committee tried to include the long route again (blue line). 5 teams drove the route which was approx. 60km on day 1. Day 2 was still the same. In 2017 this class was cancelled due to few participants. Also, in 2017 the whole race had alternative routes due to bad weather conditions. This is the only year since 2009 that Trappers Trail did not end at Bikkjebu on day 1 or had a climb up Fardalen on day 2. Instead the route of 2017 was put in Adventdalen, 35km to the a pingo by Janssonhaugen (same route both days). The three fastest teams got to do an alternative route on day 2, 40km, Bleikumbreen-Tellbreen. In 2018 the route had to change due to icy conditions at Kapp Laila and Bikkjebu. This year the race went Forskningsparken – Todalen – Bødalen – Semmelbu (open class goes Gangdalen – Reindalen - Semmelbu) on day one, and Semmelbu – Fardalen – Passet – Huset on day 2 (all teams). In 2017 when the race had to change route, a sprint leg was included. This leg was from the pingo to "jernsenga". In 2018, the standard climb competition up Fardalsbakken was kept as normal.

Price categories:

In all classes: 1.place to last place – all get prices, winner sprint, winner climbing, blue lantern (last team). Since 2014 there has also been a price for «ideal time». The one team getting closest to a given time – set by the committee after drawing a random time somewhere between the fastes and the slowest race time in the previous year.

*= In 2017 there was no regular Trappers Trail due to weather conditions. Everyone drove in Adventdalen. The three fastest teams on day 1 drove Beikumbreen - Tellbreen on day 2.

Team Novus with Fredrik Lindgren and Lena Danielsen have won TT in different classes, in total 3 times.






